▶ Draining Moats and Building Bridges. Rosemary "Rosie" Summers does not like attention, but she does like to shine the spotlight on public health. In a Hillsborough Herald Sun article about her upcoming retirement, Rosie managed to address the myth of local public health departments as just clinics for the poor, mention more than 13 services, highlight the H1N1 vaccine campaign, emphasize relationships with other health providers and stakeholders, spotlight coalitions, and credit partners at UNC. And it was a short article!

Health director of the Orange County Health Department and co-PI of the PH PBRN, Rosie is retiring May 31 after more than 30 years in academia and practice in North Carolina. Her public health career began even earlier in her native Iowa doing outreach for the Model Cities program. "I was working in public health before I even knew what it was!" Rosie joked. She went to North Carolina as a VISTA volunteer in the 1970s, and following the advice of a health educator, Rosie earned a Master of Public Health at UNC-Chapel Hill. Back to the Midwest, she worked for the Hospital Research and Education Trust writing a text of case studies supported by research and theory based on a Kellogg Foundation effort to establish rural primary care centers. To say that Rosie then returned to North Carolina "for good" hardly seems adequate.

Rosie worked at the School of Public Health for 17 years in a variety of roles, along the way earning a Doctor of Public Health in Health Policy. Almost 14 years at the Orange County Health Department followed, where she was able to apply at the local level what she had learned throughout her career. "One of my dreams while at the university was to find ways to foster collaboration between researchers and practice," Rosie noted, "and the PBRN is a natural fit. Ten health departments were already working together to find answers to common questions, and the RWJF award gave us a way to leverage incentives for faculty researchers. The network also provided a forum to bring together various kinds of practices. Some practitioners think of local health departments in academic communities as different from 'regular' health departments, and others are skeptical of researchers and how they can help."

Asked to reflect on her two years with the PH PBRNs, Rosie said, "We all need to learn to drain the moat and build a bridge. It still is hard to get faculty to frame local health department needs as generalizable questions rather than technical assistance. At the same time, it is challenging to get local health departments to value original research. This is very much a two-way communication issue. As usual in public health, we have to deal with whatever crisis is in front of us. H1N1 was an 'anticipated crisis,' but everything else still had to stop so we could focus on meeting those needs. This is frustrating to researchers, but it also presents opportunities to examine what is going on while it is going on to learn lessons for later. The Quick Strike Research Fund award allowed us to do that with H1N1. Similarly, the Research Implementation Award is facilitating a study of severe cuts in case management and the effects on health outcomes."

In 2010, Rosie served as a PHAB beta test site visitor. She is enthusiastic about the potential for accreditation to increase awareness among policymakers and the public about core public health structures and responsibilities. She believes accreditation will be helpful in eroding the myth that public health is different everywhere, an idea that contributes to the lack of knowledge of public health and its role in population safety, and that some standardization will bring positive results.

Rosie plans to spend the summer gardening and working on the dozen or so quilting projects she has started. This fall she hopes to work part time to support those hobbies. On behalf of everyone associated with the Public Health PBRN Program, THANK YOU Dr. Rosemary Summers for your devotion to our profession and the people you have served! Somehow, we think we will see you around.

- ❖ Science of Community Engagement. The Clinical & Translational Science Awards (CTSA) has issued a <u>Call for Papers</u> focusing on the science of community engagement for a special issue of the journal, *Progress in Community Health Partnerships: Research, Education, and Action.* The call specifically invites PBRN contributions and prioritizes papers that are collaborative and coauthored by community members. The deadline for submitting papers is Monday, August 1.
- ▶ Integrating Primary Care and Public Health. The American Journal of Public Health and the American Journal of Preventive Medicine are planning a joint issue addressing the question: "How do we improve population health and promote health equity through the effective integration of primary care and public health?" The multi-agency Call for Papers seeks submissions in the areas of science, education, practice, and policy and especially invites submissions co-authored by professionals in the public health and primary care fields. Manuscripts are due by August 1.

REPORTS AND PUBLICATIONS

- ▶ PHSSR Progress Report. RWJF has published <u>Strengthening the Performance and Impact of Public Health Departments: A Progress Report</u> highlighting the work of the University of Kentucky, NACCHO, ASTHO, and NALBOH in building the field of PHSSR.
- ▶ Spending Cuts and Public Health. In the May 11 issue of JAMA, Steven Woolf's commentary on the public health implications of government spending reductions is quite relevant to ongoing PH PBRN research such as the PHAST study and several RIA projects.
- ▶ New NACCHO Data. NACCHO has published a <u>preliminary report</u> of its fall 2010 survey on local health department (LHD) job losses and program funding cuts. These state-level data show the impact of ongoing financial strain on the ability of LHDs to serve and protect the health of their communities.



Funding Opportunities and Announcements

The NCC maintains a <u>list of funding opportunities</u> of interest to its networks. Grant opportunities with recurring deadlines are tracked and updated.

NEW LISTINGS THIS WEEK

▶ Public Health and Prevention Fund: Community Transformation Grants. HHS has opened the application process for the Community Transformation Grants, a key piece of the ACA still to be implemented through the Public Health and Prevention Fund. This is an important expansion of the nation's investment in evidence-based, cross-cutting public health work, so its reach, implementation and impact needs to be studied in PHSSR and perhaps through the work of the PH PBRNs.



Testing Evidence-Based Interventions. HRSA's Healthy Weight Collaborative is recruiting community teams with existing linkages between primary care, public health, and community organizations with experience working together in obesity prevention to implement, test, and disseminate promising and evidence-based interventions to prevent and treat obesity for children and families using the Breakthrough Series Collaborative approach. Additional information is available at the <u>project website</u>. Applications are being accepted online until June 3.

PREVIOUSLY ANNOUNCED LISTINGS

- National Institute on Minority Health and Health Disparities (NIMHD). According to the FOA, "priority topic areas for projects include: 1) information and communications technologies to increase access to care, 2) policies or initiatives to increase the supply of rural healthcare practitioners and/or the use of paraprofessionals or peer-led health services to supplement existing healthcare services, 3) strategies to organize, manage, finance, and deliver high quality care, and 4) translational and trans-disciplinary research linking the social determinants of health and health disparities that is innovative, rigorous and well grounded in appropriate theoretical framework." Deadline for application: June 8.
- ▶ Accreditation Preparation. NACCHO is sponsoring a funding opportunity for LHDs to engage in community health assessments and community health improvement plans. The program will award 12 competitive grants of \$35,000 each. Visit the NACCHO website for additional information. Application deadline: May 23.

- * AHRQ Research Centers for Excellence in Clinical Preventive Service. AHRQ has made \$4.5 million available to fund three research centers with a focus on one of the following programmatic areas: patient safety, health equity, or health care system implementation. The project period is for three years with a \$1.5 million annual budget for each year. For more information, click on RFA-HS-11-005. Application deadline: May 23.
- ▶ PHSSR Call for Proposals. RWJF has issued a CFP "to expand the evidence base for effective public health policy and practice through investment in *Public Health Services and Systems Research* (PHSSR). PHSSR examines the organization, financing and delivery of public health services within a community and determines the links between the quality and performance of the public health system and population health outcomes." Deadline for Brief Proposals: May 24.
- ▶ Health Impact Project. A CFP has been issued for the Health Impact Project: Advancing Smarter Policies for Healthier Communities, a collaboration of RWJF and The Pew Charitable Trusts. This CFP is for organizations that wish to undertake a health impact assessment as a way to demonstrate their value in policymaking. Grants will range from \$25,000 to \$125,000 with 18-month project periods. Up to eight projects will be awarded. Deadline for brief online proposals: June 1.



- **SIPS.** CDC's Prevention Research Centers <u>Special Interest Project Competitive Supplements</u> (SIPS) are available to universities housing PRCs. Application deadline: June 1.
- **Round Two: Digging into Data Challenge.** Eight international research funders have announced a grant competition designed to encourage cutting-edge research in the humanities and social sciences. Information about the competition and the application process can be found on the <u>Digging into Data Challenge</u> website. Final application deadline: June 16.
- → HHS Preparedness. CDC's <u>Public Health Emergency Preparedness Cooperative Agreement Program</u>. Note eligibility requirements and opportunities for collaboration. Application deadline: June 17.
- ▶ **RWJF Healthy Eating Research.** The RWJF *Healthy Eating Research: Building Evidence to Prevent Childhood Obesity* program has released its 2011 <u>Call for Proposals</u>. Rapid-response award concept papers are due August 2.
